
Frances Tosdevin (nee Stanford)

This resulted in her becoming a traditionally published author last year when she was 61! The first book she wrote was "The Bear and her Book" (ISBN 978-1912979608), illustrated by Sophia O'Connor. It was published by Uclan Publishing in Oct 2021 and was the Independent's Children's Book of the Week soon after it was published - a great thrill for Frances!

The second book written by Frances, was published very recently on 5th April 5th 2022, called "An Artist's Eye" (ISBN 978-0711264830), illustrated by Clémence Monnet. It is published by Frances Lincoln Children's Books, and is a story about finding your own unique way to see like an artist.

Frances has another picture book coming out later this year, and a fourth currently set for 2023.

Frances has the happiest memories of her time at Rydes Hill, and it was here she first developed a love of creative writing. In fact, she never wanted to leave, and is sure she would still be a pupil here if it was allowed!

Why do birds have wings? If they did not, they would not be birds, one might think. Melanie's answer was more elaborate since it owed her first place in the St John's College Oxford Inspire Programme last year. HISTORICAL UPDATE

Miss Boyle has been keen to use the newly released data from the 1921 census to shed more light on the history of Rydes Hill House:

Just over 100 years ago, the 1921 Census was taken and is now available for study. This is always an exciting time for genealogists and historians as it shines a light into the everyday life of members of your family and the world they inhabited.

Sadly, it wasn't opened in time for the update of the Rydes Hill book but my interest in the history of Rydes Hill continues



The census data for the *Rydes Hill House* confirms that the house was inhabited by the new American owner, Mr Robert Hervey Cabell and his second wife Eva Patterson. Their two younger children, Helen (22) and Joseph (20), were still living at home. Robert (52) is the managing director of *Armour & Co* and is commuting to London. Joseph has also joined the company as a salesman but is based in their Guildford office. This may be why the family had bought the house the previous year. Not surprisingly, neither his wife nor daughter are working.

There are 2 visitors in the house on the day the census was taken. The first was an American young lady of 24, Frances Gilman, who may well have been Helen's friend. The second was Jacque Albert de Lailhaear (31), a French citizen who was an exporter of paper. His relationship with the family at this time is unknown but

romance may well have already been in the air as he would go on to marry Helen in 1924, in Paris.

Beyond confirming various information, there was therefore little new to be found. However, the Cabells were not the only inhabitants and the information on their servants was largely new. This can be divided into those who lived in the house and those who lived in a number of cottages in the surrounding area.

Six servants lived in at this time and would have had bedrooms in the small rooms that can be found up the brown stairs and in the rooms off the kitchens. The most senior servants appear to have been



Ernest Ivan Bell, the butler and Caroline Knowles the cook. Interestingly the butler's wife, Gertrude Louise Bell, was working as a housemaid. Rather surprisingly their two younger children had been boarded out down the road at the lodge of *Rydes Hill Lodge*. It may well be that they were waiting for one of the estate cottages to be vacated. One gets the impression that Mr Cabell may well have had to hire whoever was prepared to do the job as servants were becoming increasingly hard to find. From what I have been able to ascertain, Ernest had not been in service before and was working as a milkman in London before the war. He would later go on to work as a riding master.



Caroline Alice Knowles (36) was a local girl whose family had been in service. By 1901 she was a cook and would continue in this role until at least the Second World War. She was single and her widowed mother and younger siblings were living in one of the cottages that was in Rydes Hill garden. She was helped by a young kitchen maid, Ada Christina Radford (16). She too was local and before too long was to fall for one of the young assistant gardeners, Arthur G Grist (18) who was living with his parents at Broomfields. They were married in 1928 by which time Ada had risen to be a cook and Arthur had left service to become a decorator. In the 1960s they joined thousands of other young families to emigrate to Australia.

Living in was also the housemaid, Emily Bertha O'Brien (26) who came from London and Frederick Burnell (22) who worked as a footman. As far as I know, he was the first footman who had worked at *Rydes Hill House*. He had been born and brought up in Godalming and had served on HMS *Victory* during the First World War. On enlisting, he was 5 ft 4 inches and had brown hair and blue eyes. No doubt he had grown by the time he gained employment as a footman and may well have learnt the art of waiting at table during his time with the Royal Navy. His life of service was short lived and by 1926 he had left.

One of the additions of the 1921 census was the inclusion of where and who you worked for. As a result, we have a much better knowledge of those who worked at Rydes Hill House but lived out. In addition to Arthur, we know that the gardens were headed up by John James Huck (46) who lived with his family next to Arthur. He came from a farming family in Westmoreland and having initially tried his hand as a railway engine driver, he had changed track having married Ruth Burdock who had been born and brought up in Rydes Hill. Her father had been a gardener and may have even worked at Ryde Hill House when the Williams lived there. Sadly, James died young in 1926.



All these servants were new to me despite knowing of a number who would work for the Cabells in later years. The exception was Mr James O'Brien who was to work as a chauffeur up until the Cabells left for America in 1934. In 1921 he was living at *Clock House Cottages* with his wife and infant son. He would later move into the lodge which at this time was being rented out to an employer of Drummonds, a local firm. He was responsible for at least 2 cars including a Royals Royce which were housed in the former stable block, (now our gym). The housemaid, Emily O'Brien, was his sister.
